## A. Personal Statement

As a behavioral psychologist, I have a strong grounding in the theory and treatment of addictions, with a focus on tobacco addiction. I have been a P.I., Co-Investigator, or Mentor on multiple NIH-funded trials on smoking cessation and have expertise in clinical trial, survey, and qualitative research design and implementation. As an MPH and member of the faculty of Preventive Medicine and Public Health, I am well versed in epidemiology and principles of population health. My graduate training and dissertation work focused on community-based prevention of alcohol, tobacco, and drug problems among youth in municipalities across Kansas. I have conducted and or consulted on research studies among many underserved, high risk populations including drug users, the homeless, rural smokers, and Latinos. I direct a hospital-based smoking cessation service that serves 800 smokers per year which requires me to keep abreast of new developments in tobacco treatment, and in treating smokers with co-morbid conditions such as cancer, cardiovascular disease, pulmonary diseases, and mental illnesses. Last, I have a strong network of research and service collaborators in tobacco treatment. I am President of the Association for Medical Research and Education on Substance Abuse (AMERSA), I serve as a Commissioner on Tobacco Treatment Specialist Training Program Accreditation Commission—an international body that accredits tobacco treatment training programs, and I am Deputy Editor of the journal *Nicotine & Tobacco Research*. These ties keep me up-to-date with the emerging research issues and problems facing smokers.
